REGULAR MEETING DE SMET COMMON COUNCIL November 13, 2019

The De Smet Common Council met in regular session on November 13, 2019, at 5:00 p.m., with the following present: Bret Jensen, Lowell Hansen, George Cavanaugh, Norman Whitaker, Jay Slater, Mayor Gary Wolkow, FO Tracey Larson, and City Attorney Todd Wilkinson. Council member Botkin arrived late. Absent: none.

Mayor Wolkow called the meeting to order at 5:00 PM.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Mayor Wolkow announced that the City of De Smet was the recipient of the Gold Level Loss Control/Safety Achievement Award from the SD Public Assurance Alliance and the SDML Workers' Compensation. Mayor Wolkow also thanked Safety Coordinator Karen Hansen and all the city employees for the safety precaution measures taken when working.

VALLEY FIBERCOM: Juanita Braun, Sales Associate for Valley FiberCom, met with the council to present a proposal for phone, internet, and television services for the City of De Smet. Fiber optic lines are planned to be installed in the Spring starting on the west side of Calumet Avenue. Braun also informed the council of features such as vacation rates during the off season for the pool and museum, and having the option to increase the internet speed during a specific

conference at the Event Center. Some changes will need to be discussed before a comparison of services are reviewed.

LENDING LIBRARY: Mary Lee met with the council to present the idea of a lending library. A small wood structure would display the books for people to borrow in exchange of a book to be left in the lending library. Lee would cover the expenses of the lending library. Motion was made by Slater, seconded by Botkin, to approve Mary Lee proceeding with the lending library, and to waive the building permit fee, all voting aye, motion carried.

ISAAC WILDE: Isaac Wilde met with the council to inquire about the status of leasing an additional area of land south of the area he currently rents. Information of the developed lots and future lots are still being looked into.

2020 LIQUOR & WINE LICENSE & OPERATING AGREEMENT RENEWALS: This being the date and time advertised motion was made by Cavanaugh, seconded by Slater, to reissue liquor licenses to the Main Stop (off-sale), Grumpy's (on-sale), Dugout (on-sale), Wheaties (on-sale), Kingsbury Club House (on-sale), Oxbow Restaurant (on-sale wine & cider), Dollar General (on/off-sale wine & cider), and Maynard's (off-sale liquor and on/off-sale wine & cider) for the year 2020, and renew the operating agreement with Dollar General that will be set to expire on November 30, 2021, all voting aye, motion carried.

PUBLIC COMMENTS: none.

SURPLUS PROPERTY: Motion was made by Jensen, seconded by Whitaker, to approve declaring the following property as surplus: Lot 3, Block 2 of the Subdivision Government Lot 1 in Section Thirty-Four (34), Township One Hundred Eleven (111) North, Range Fifty-Six (56) West of the 5 P.M., City of De Smet, Kingsbury County, South Dakota, all voting aye, motion carried.

PROPERTY DEED: Motion was made by Cavanaugh, seconded by Slater, to approve Resolution #2019-5, approving the transfer of property legally described as Lot 3, Block 2 of the Subdivision Government Lot 1 in Section Thirty -Four (34), Township One Hundred Eleven (111) North, Range Fifty-Six (56) West of the 5th P.M., City of De Smet, Kingsbury County, South Dakota to the De Smet Development Corporation for economic development use, all voted aye, motion carried.

WHEREAS, the City of De Smet, South Dakota, has declared the following described real property surplus and De Smet Development Corporation, of De Smet, South Dakota has requested the real property be transferred by the City to the De Smet Development Corporation, towit:

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Motion was made by Botkin, seconded by Jensen, to approve going into executive session for contractual items at 5:48 PM, all voted aye, motion carried. Mayor Wolkow declared the council out of executive session at 6:17 PM.

CONCRETE REPAIR: Motion was made by Cavanaugh, seconded by Whitaker, to approve payment of \$1,989.00 to Raise Rite, Inc. for raising two sections of concrete that have shifted at the Event Center, all voting aye, motion carried. An amount of \$500.00 will be reimbursed to the City by the local contractor.

HEALTH INSURANCE RENEWAL: A contract from The Health Pool of South Dakota for employee health insurance with a renewal premium of \$8,147.36/month was reviewed. The new premium would be an increase of \$417.43 per month to keep the current policy. Motion was made by Hansen, seconded by Whitaker, to renew the Plan B health insurance policy for the full-time city employees, to be effective January 1, 2020, all voting aye, motion carried.

PERSONNEL: Finance Officer Larson reported that three individuals had been interviewed for the Assistant Streets/RUS/Airport position.

Motion was made by Slater, seconded by Whitaker, to approve hiring Jason Springer as the Assistant of the Street/RUS/Airport position at a rate of \$15.50 per hour, all voting aye, motion carried.

EVENT CENTER: Event Center Director Kristy Hubbard informed the council that the Buildings/Recreation Committee had met with representatives of the De Smet School District and Attorney Todd Wilkinson to discuss the contract between the City and School for usage of the Event Center. Many of the amendments discussed were minor variations due to changes in usage since the original contract was signed. Hubbard clarified to the council that the information printed in the De Smet News on October 16^{th} and the De Smet School minutes printed on October 30th were incorrect and the Event Center restrooms/locker rooms were available for public and team usage during the home football game held on September 20th. School staff made the decision to close the men's restroom/locker room for the opposing team usage. Hubbard told the council that the Event Center building has the capability for other uses during a home game and could still accommodate the parties involved. Hubbard requested temporarily reducing the hours that the Event Center is open due to staffing shortage, closing the center on Saturdays if there isn't a scheduled event, and closing the center December 26th through December 28th while she is gone for a family event. The changes in hours will be temporary until additional staffing is hired.

ROCS TRANSPORTATION: Peter Smith, Executive Director of Rural Office of Community Services, Inc., and Katlin Johnson met with the council to present a transportation service that is being discussed and developed for De Smet. Smith reported that they currently have over 25 other transit locations. They can provide many different services including the delivery of meals on wheels, transportation for people to appointments, ball games, church, and providing rides to children after school to daycare. All of the employed drivers have a Class A Commercial Driver's License, and have had background checks and drug testing. ROCS will also utilize volunteer help from the community. A local board would determine the rate for rides, and would meet on a monthly basis. Medicaid will also pay for rides for qualifying recipients. ROCS is a non-profit organization that works with the SD DOT for funding. The program funding is based on an 80% funded and 20% local match. The 20% match can include volunteer help, a place to park the bus/van, scheduling, and donations. Smith has already consulted the SD DOT for approval, and is looking for a pre-owned bus/van that could be used for the De Smet transportation program. AIPORT PAYMENTS: Motion was made by Hansen, seconded by Botkin, to approve pay request #19 in the amount of \$17,555.93 to Helms & Associates for the Hardstand & taxilane project, and pay request #4 to Midland Contracting, Inc. in the amount of \$212,832.39 for the

Hardstand & taxilane project all voting aye, motion carried. These airport project expenses will be reimbursed by 95% from grant funding.

FINANCIAL REPORTS: Motion was made by Cavanaugh, seconded Whitaker, to approve the October 2019 Cash Balances Report as presented by the Finance Officer, all voting aye, motion carried.

OVERTIME: Motion by Cavanaugh, seconded by Jensen, to approve the overtime hours for the month of October as presented, all voting aye, motion carried.

OTHER: Other non-action items of discussion were as follows: 1) October law enforcement report; and 2) the status of the contract with the school for usage of the Event Center.

ADJOURN: There being no further business the meeting was adjourned on motion by Slater.
